Read Letter from D. J. N. Harrahan dated 11th June 1894
re stating that of which the following is a copy.

Gentlemen. Relative to a letter from the Local Government Board and in compliance with the Order of your Board on the 28th ultimo regarding an outbreak of Fever in this District previously reported to you. I beg to state that there were in all ten cases of Fever since March last, which occurred in four separate Villages and in five different Cottages. All these assumed a low type of continued fever running on from four to six weeks, with prolonged comatose ascence, and marked debility; two old women died of it and a boy died in the course of the fever from tubercular meningitis. Since the Autumn of last year Influenza has been epidemic in this District, many cases being very severe and protracted, and frequently accompanied by exceedingly high temperature, with most troublesome lung, gastric, rheumatic and nervous affections. Entire families becoming prostrated very quickly, one after another, some being attacked more severely than others; those who were weak or debilitated from any cause, as a rule suffered most. Under these circumstances, considering the sort of houses the people live in, and a complete want of proper nursing one had to contend with in addition, contaminated and confined air and speaking generally filthy surroundings, and mouldy food for the sick; those conditions together with the low state of nervous prostration caused by this epidemic of so-called Influenza in my opinion started this fever. I have seen three cases of well-marked Typhus Fever.

[These Reports are to be made up and forwarded by the Medical Officers to the Board of Guardians quarterly, viz., on the 31st March, the 30th June, the 30th September, and the 31st December.]

Reports (Form P containing the names of Children born in the District who are over three months of age and have not been vaccinated) from the Medical Officers of the following Dispensary Districts, viz:—

in the neighbourhood, but outside this District recent by those cases have been duly attended to. I state this to show that there are different types of Fever here. Within the Cottages, there are no means for isolation, but I find the people, when duly warned of Fever in a household keep away from it for their own sakes, except the immediate relatives of the sick, and I think it is they who to a large extent spread the infection, for naturally they freely go to nurse and other visits come into contact with their relatives who are down, and there is nothing to prevent such people from mixing indiscriminately amongst congregations at Mass on Sundays, or in crowded and unventilated shops on market days.

There seems a strong objection on the part of patients to go into the Union Hospital, and on the part of their relatives to allow them to be removed, the Priests and I have urged the removal of such of those patients as were fit to be removed to the Hospital, but without avail. I shall of course send further reports relative to these cases.

Ballinrobe 11th June 1894.

Gentlemen. In obedience to your Order of the 28th March I beg to furnish you with the following particulars as to the prevalence of Fever in this District since 1st January 1894. There were ten cases of Typhus, three of Worm Fever, two of Gastric Fever, and one Rheumatic. All but three referred to go to Hospital, all have recovered except four cases, two of which died of Typhus in Hospital. Besides these there were, and are, some nice cases that I am not in a position to report upon, because I was not in attendance on them. There is little means of isolation in private houses, and yet the disease did not spread from one member of a family to another in more than three instances. The number of deaths amongst out patients was two in all, including cases, including my own and those of other Medical Practitioners, whereas, of those admitted into Hospital there have been two deaths out of three patients. This state of facts impels me to recommend, as I did in my letter of the 28th ultimo, the employment of a skilled night nurse as well as a day nurse in the Fever Hospital, for the Fever nurse who keeps cannot remain awake night and day, and while she is asleep the patient is entrusted to the care of ignorant persons. This I know to be the reason why so few patients enter the Hospital. One case of Typhus, not under my treatment, proved fatal. Two other cases are now under my treatment in the Rectory and Ballyrouke, and refused to go to Hospital.

Such a trained Assistant may be had at almost as cheap a rate as an unskilled nurse. The Nurses Training Institution Nibers Quay having agreed to make special terms with your Board.

Since I have taken charge of the Fever Hospital in Nov 1889, there have been 65 cases of infectious disease treated in the institution, of this number, nine, died. Of the nine deaths seven were due to enteric fever, and only two, to Typhus. Of the seven whose deaths were due to enteric fever, two were very old persons whose deaths

By want and privation, their deaths might have been caused by any slight illness. Another recovered from the fever only to fall a victim to acute phthisis.
