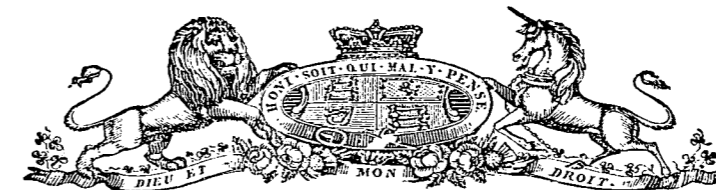

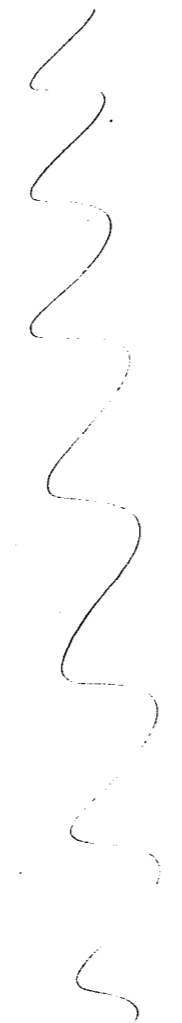

Having been a member of your Board for many years, and being a well-wisher in the opinion of the Court it my duty to mention the following circumstance which came before me as one of the Barones of the County that you may take such notice of it you may think fit.

At an inquest held by me at Newbarn on a man named Denis Glynn it appeared in evidence that he had been an inmate of the Ballinacree workhouse, and about a fortnight since,

since he was seen by a respectable witness, at about seven o'clock at night sitting on the Road side near his witness's house, and as the night was cold and freezing severely, the witness went towards him, and asked him some questions, he appeared to be weak and feeble and said he was in the Ballinacree workhouse, and that he was turned, or ordered out of it and that he was going towards a friend's house, some distance off, and asked witness how much of water he had to get and after a little he went off in the direction of his friend's house, he was not seen alive afterwards but was found dead in a field near the friend's house he stated he was going to, and when found he was on his knees - with his face to the ground as if endeavouring to get up before his death.

The Jury found a verdict according to the facts, and also stated that in their opinion the Deceased was not in a fit state to be turned out of the workhouse.

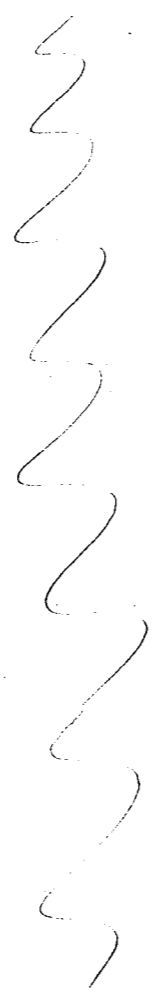

Letter from the Rev. Thomas M. Walter, P.P. of which the following is a copy:—

The Board of Guardians, Wallwork Union.  
Gentlemen.

The refusal of Relieving Officer Kelly, to grant in-  
Procurator last, provisional relief to a poor family in this  
parish, induces me to bring the subject under your consideration,  
in order to test the legality of his act, or rather omission. I  
would have done so much earlier, but that I should be very  
ill, in fever. The circumstances of the case, as far as I  
could ascertain, are as follows:—

A Widow, named Hearn, - having a Son and  
daughter, aged respectively 15 and 17 years, lived at Kilticran  
- a village at the southern extremity of this parish, close to  
Droghda, and about 15 short miles from Wallwork,  
From motives of charity she gave shelter to a poor old woman,  
who had been, for some days previous, stopping at the house  
of a sick person in Wallwork, soon after her admission the  
old woman complained of being ill - Five days afterwards,  
the Widow's daughter had a Sick, - on the 15<sup>th</sup> of

December

December, I was called upon to attend them, in doing  
so, I learned that the old woman had been there 10 days,  
and the little girl 6 days, ill. Judging they were in fever,  
and from the wretched appearance that the house presented,  
that they were very poor and destitute, I advised the widow  
to send immediately for the medical and Relieving officers, and  
not to allow her son, in the meantime, to remain in the  
house, - On about 10 days after, hearing she was dangerously  
ill of fever, I went to attend her, - The old woman and little  
girl, I found able to crawl from one side of the room to the  
other - seeing them very weak and fearfully emaciated, I  
inquired what kind of nourishment had they? Their answer  
was, nothing but potatoes, that some labourer next the  
neighbour's sent, was scarcely sufficient for the woman  
she was lying ill - To my further inquiries they replied,  
that Relieving Officer Kelly had been to see them, that he  
refused giving them relief in any shape or form, as they  
would not consent, to go to the workhouse. After attending  
the widow - who was a strong able woman and about 40  
years of age, I did my utmost to induce her to send again,  
for the Doctor and Relieving officers, as she considered the assistance  
of both me and the other, necessary for the preservation of her  
life, she refused, stating, that from the manner in which she  
was treated before, she did not think their presence again, would  
be of any use or assistance to her, that besides, she had no  
person to go such a long journey as it was to Wallwork, but  
her son, who was required at home, and bringing them beef, water,  
&c. - she died about the 10<sup>th</sup> of last January - The Constable  
stationed at Kilticran, contributed, each 2s, towards the  
expense of her burial, there being no person willing to go in  
to the House, to assist in coffining her remains, her son had  
to do so. - Immediately after, her husband, was frequently  
attended by Dr. Haughey, and relieved by Relieving Officer  
Hyper. The boy is now quite well.

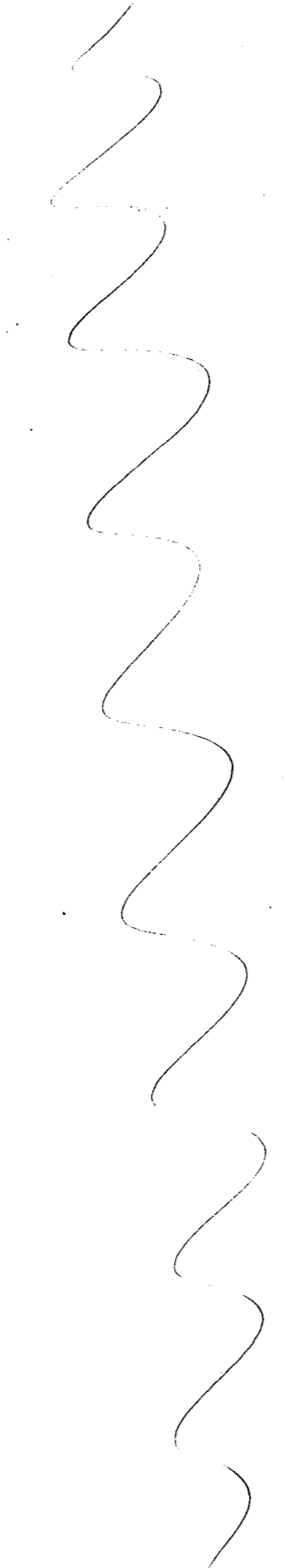

Letter from same No 57 d 8 / 1872, dated 6<sup>th</sup> March, 1872, — acknowledging the receipt of a resolution of the Board of Guardians at Stalyham Division, of the 22<sup>nd</sup> February, forwarding a copy of a Letter received from the Reverend Thomas M. Wallis, P. B. in which he calls attention to the conduct of Mr John Kelly, Relief Officer and St. James Pollard Kelly in the case of a family named Howard and a woman named Sally, together with copies of explanations received from the Relief Officer and Medical Officer on the subject, and in reference therein stating that they do not consider these explanations satisfactory, especially that of the Relieving Officer, and requesting that the Guardians will state whether they can continue to have further confidence in him as Relieving Officer.

The Commissioners call attention to these Letters of the 27<sup>th</sup> August, 1867 on the subject of increasing the number of Relieving Officers for the Division, and they request that the Board

of Guardians will take into consideration the expediency of dividing the Division into new relief Districts and appointing an additional Relieving Officer as suggested in that Letter.

Proposed by Captain Charles Howe Knox  
Seconded by Thomas Gyles, Esq. — and Unanimously Resolved that although the Board of Guardians cannot but concur in the views expressed by the Poor Law Commissioners in the foregoing Letter as regards Mr Kelly's neglect to afford relief to the family of the late widow Howard and a woman named Sally, yet the Board believe that Mr Kelly acted solely from a mistaken sense of his duties and responsibilities, and also through a desire to carry out the wishes of the Board, which is most anxious that all persons suffering from Fever in its incipient stages should be removed to the workhouse Hospital in order to prevent the spread of that disease.

Mr Kelly was attacked with Fever of a severe type immediately after his visit to the family of the late widow Howard and Mrs Sally, and it is very probable that he contracted that disease on the occasion of his visit, — were it not for his illness he would doubtless have felt it to be his duty to report his visit, and to afford such relief as should have been required.

The Board beg to draw attention to the fact that the deceased widow Howard never made application for relief, or they to the Medical Officer or Relieving Officer, nor did any other person on her behalf.

In the present complaint of neglect of duty as the first which has been preferred against Mr Kelly during the last seven years, and as he has hitherto discharged the duties of his office to the entire satisfaction of the Board of Guardians and the public, the Board would not be justified in withdrawing their confidence from him.

The Board agree with the Poor Law Commissioners that it is desirable to divide the Division into new relief Districts and to appoint an additional Relieving Officer, and subject to the Commissioners approval, it is Resolved that on and from the

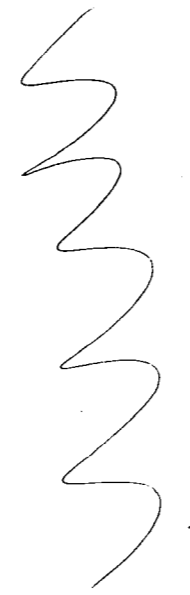

D. Kelly, Medical Officer, in the case of a family named Moran and a woman named Sally; and enclosing for the information of the Guardians a copy of a letter which they have received from the Rev. Mr. Walker on the subject, and stating that the Rev. Mr. Walker's letter raises an important question affecting the Relieving Officer, namely, — whether or not direct application had been made to him for aid and relief on the behalf of the family and woman referred to, It also affects Mr. Kelly's statement that removal to the workhouse could have been safely carried out at the time of her visit.

The Commissioners request that the Board of Guardians will be good enough to re-consider their resolution of the 7<sup>th</sup> Instant on the subject.

Letter from same No. 6852/1872, dated 13<sup>th</sup> March, 1872, referring to the proposal to allow a sum of Four pounds for running and station to Mr. Moran an inmate of the workhouse who has acted as Nurse in the Fever Hospital, and stating that if the Guardians think it advisable to put the woman in the position of Assistant Nurse, she should take her discharge from the workhouse and be appointed in the ordinary way.

Gentlemen,

I beg to inform you that 112 Cases of Fever have been treated by me since last October, all of which have terminated successfully with the exception of three, two of whom were in a helpless state when admitted and succumbed in a few days afterwards, - of the remainder three cases have arisen in the House, and considering the extent to which the disease prevailed in the Town and neighbourhood since the above period, this fact may be regarded as a satisfactory proof of the sanitary condition of the Workhouse.

The gables of the Fever Hospital are in a continual state of dampness, the chimneys do not draw so that intense smoke prevails almost at all times, the soil has penetrated the walls, which together with the dampness gives the department an appearance disagreeable to the Establishment.

I would respectfully request your earnest attention to these defects for should an Epidemic similar to that which existed for the last six months, occur again the Fever Hospital would in its present condition be both an unhealthy and uncomfortable receptacle for patients.

I also beg to request your attention to the existing arrangements respecting the cleaning of the closets in the different departments: the stench at times being intolerable, in consequence of which frequent complaints have been made to me by the inmates, and in my opinion these arrangements are defective and injurious to the health of the inmates.

The Workhouse Master's attention was called to that part of the Medical Officer's Report relating to the closets, and he was requested to be most particular in having the closets in the different departments cleaned at an early hour every morning, and in preventing any bad smells from coming.

I have just visited every department of the House and Fever Hospital, accompanied by the collector, the collector, and by the Hospital Steward in Fever Hospital; and I feel bound to state that the Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

to express my unqualified qualification with every thing I have seen — the scrupulous cleanliness in every part of the House reflects great credit on the officers; whilst the treatment of the sick is equally creditable to the medical officer in charge. The successful treatment of Fever patients for the past few years in the House has done wonders, to my certain knowledge, in removing the almost insurmountable repugnance entertained by the poor peasantry in former years to enter the walls of a workhouse at all; and has thereby prevented the spread of a heathenish disease throughout the district. — I have never visited a workhouse where in all that could reasonably be desired has been so nearly attained.

Circular Letter from Poor Law Commissioners No. 54 m/72 dated 29 April, 1872, requesting to be furnished with a Return respecting the Rates made, and agreed upon during 7th week of March, 1872.

Letter from same, No. 10157/1872, dated 10: April, 1872, stating that they have received their Inspector, D. Bradie's Half Yearly report relating to the opinion from which it appears that he recently inspected the Workhouse, and that it was clean and orderly; the Provisions examined by him were of fair quality and the supply of clothing and bedding in store was sufficient and of good quality. — D. Bradie further states that the children are making fair progress in literary attainments, they were clean and neat in appearance and looked strong and healthy, and that the clothing was comfortable.

Letter from same No. 8227, 1872, dated 10: April, 1872, — declining to sanction the appointment of Mr. John Howitt as Voluntary Officer and Sanitary Inspector, and requesting the Guardians to proceed to another appointment.

Letter from same No. 9900/1872, dated 10: April, 1872, with reference to a resolution of the Board of Guardians of the 4: district relating to certain defects in the Genoa Hospital reported by the Medical Officer of the Workhouse, stating that having referred to D. Bradie, Poor Law Inspector on the subject, he suggests that the Drives of the Hospital should be remodelled, and galvanised iron pipes furnished: and requesting that the Guardians will take D. Bradie's suggestion into their consideration.

The Board of Guardians having taken D. Bradie's suggestion into consideration is of opinion that the intolerable stench complained of by the Medical Officer proceeds entirely from the rotting state of the old ironable boxes in the wash and Drives, which have been in use for many years, and it is Resolved that the clerks be authorized to procure some new boxes for the Drives, and directed to keep them constantly deodorized.

Resolved that the Board be directed to cause advertisements to be inserted in the "Baltimore Chronicle", and "All England's Exchange", giving notice that the Board of Guardians will on Tuesday the 2: proxima, proceed to the appointment of a Voluntary Officer for the Workhouse District at a salary of £5. per annum, with an allowance of £10 per annum as remuneration for services as Inspector of Resources.

That the Board having carefully considered the Commissioners Letters, fully concurs with them; as to the grave importance of the subject involved; but while it accepts the views of the Commissioners as to the necessity of their visiting with the most severe punishment, Officials who are guilty of neglect or dereliction of their duties towards the sick or suffering poor: yet the Board hopes, the Commissioners will mercifully consider the case of the Refusing Officer, who about the time was sleeping and battling against a fever, caught in the discharge of his duties; and subsequently his life, was despoised of for several days.

That the Refusing Officer having for over seven years faithfully and zealously discharged his duties, to the entire satisfaction of the Board; without a single complaint during that time; the Board begs of the Commissioners, that they will kindly and leniently reconsider his case; as his wife and family have no other means of support, and are entirely dependent on his present position.

That referring to Doctor Kelly's case, the Board having taken into consideration his zealous, faithful and efficient services for over five years, as Medical Assistant of the Institution; and that his treatment of the sick has been ever kind, charitable and attentive; as shown by the very low mortality amongst the patients under his charge at all times, and during severe and trying Epidemics; places the fullest confidence in him; and views his case and that of the Refusing Officer as being rather of omission, than otherwise; while the Board considers that on this occasion; the Commissioners will have fully attained their object, and that of the Guardians, by the reward now given, which will be a salutary one for all concerned.

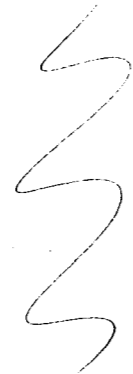

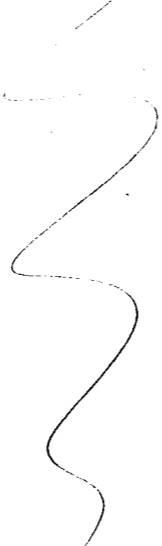

Letter from same N<sup>o</sup>. 13,048, dated 16<sup>th</sup> May, 1872, forwarding to the Board of Guardians a copy of a communication which they have received from a man named David Keegan who is desirous of having his infant child admitted to the Workhouse; and stating that the child referred to being an infant and deprived of the maternal support by the death of its mother, it may be regarded as requiring medical care and may therefore be admitted to the Workhouse under the proviso in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sect<sup>n</sup> of the Act 25 & 26 Vic cap 80, without requiring the other members of the family to come in.

Resolved that the Board accept the Tender of Mr. Michael Bliffard to supply 77 pairs of galvanized Iron Leaded 17 gauge 70 apiece for the Workhouse Pipes, at a sum of £7.12.6 each, the 70 apiece to be delivered at the Workhouse on or before the 15<sup>th</sup> of July next.

The Clerk informed the Board of Guardians that Mr. Honaria Byrne, Hospital Nurse, had obtained leave from three of the Guardians to leave the Hospital on Tuesday last, in order to attend at the interment of her brother who died at Foxhall on that day, and that Mr. Byrne did not return to the Hospital until this morning. It appearing that the duties of Hospital Nurse had been discharged by the allocation of Mr. Byrne's absence, it is Resolved that the Board does not object to the leave granted to her under the circumstances.

Mr. Bruen, Workhouse Officer, applied for one month's leave of absence, and submitted a certificate from Dr. Kelly, of which the following is a copy:—

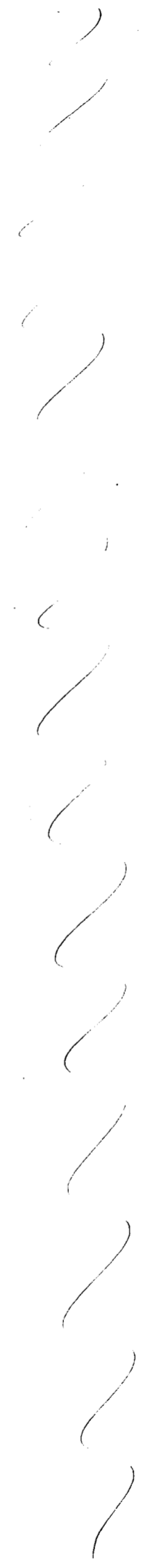
