A.D. 1225. Annals of the Four Masters mention Meelick as the place where Hugh O'Connor and the English pursued the sons of Roderick O'Connor to, and where they plundered around the place for three days and nights and the O'Garra's of Leyry had to make peace with them.

A castle of which there is now no trace, existed at Meelick. according to Mac Firbis "adam O'Crack built the castle of Meelick".

The French, or at least a contingent of them, are said to have passed through Meelick to Swiftford after the "Cullinstown Mass".
