Mr Robinson states that the floors and stairs of the Infirmary were not as clean as they should be and the occasion of his visit was the whole of that building exposed to his view and states which was by no means creditable to the officers connected with it.

Mr Robinson reports that the stairs of the other offices of the Workhouse appear to be sufficiently clean.

Mr Robinson also reports that the chimney shafts in the Infirmary and Work Hospital need attention, and that the chimneys and the entrance buildings require to be repaired, that many of the windows are broken and in a bad state, the wind being a great nuisance, and the Board request that the Board should refer to any possible operations connected therewith.

Mr Robinson observes that painting inside and out is very much required, and the Board forward a specification which the Guardians are at liberty to use when entering into a contract for the work.
