Gentlemen,

I beg to report that on several occasions during the past week, I observed a disposition on the part of the Able-bodied Male Paupers of the Workhouse to resist the Officers in the execution of their duties, more particularly the Schoolmaster, — On the 17th Inst. I was obliged to put two of the Paupers named Michael Conroy, and Michael Faucher, committed to Prison for making use of threatening language to the Schoolmaster, On Monday the 20th Inst. a Man named Peter Morin, threatened the Officers of the Workhouse, and stated that the Paupers would ill treat them, he also attempted to strike

struck another Pauper a blow of a large stick in my presence, — for this offence, and for his generally insubordinate Conduct, I got a warrant for his apprehension, and the Police came to execute it, the arrest was about being made in the Dining-Hall, as Morin refused to come with me to my office where Head Const. Smith, Constable Dancy, and Sub Constable Sanders were waiting for his arrival, whilst I was endeavoring to persuade him to come quietly with me, he attempted to strike the Schoolmaster with a bar of iron which he had concealed under his Jacket — I immediately took hold of him before he had time to give the blow, thereupon other Paupers rose in a state of great excitement, and commenced throwing tin-platters, &c, — and but for the presence of the Police and the action and power by them to suppress what I may fairly term a "riot", I believe that the worst consequences would have resulted to me and the Schoolmaster, as I considered our lives to be in imminent danger, — I at once swore Informations against the principal rioters, who were tried at the last Petty Sessions of Ballinacree, and sentenced as follows:—

- Patt Killeen - For threatening my life, 2 months at hard labour
- Patt Kilpariff - For threatening Schoolmaster's life, 3 months at hard labour
- Michl. Faucher } For insubordination, 1 month each, at
- Michl. Conroy } hard labour,
- John Morin }
- Peter Morin }

Make this opportunity of returning my best thanks to Mr. Abbott Secy. Genl. and the Police under his command, namely:— Head Const. Smith

Smith, Constable Barry, and Sub Constable Simons, for the prosecution and laudable manner in which they exerted themselves in quelling this serious disturbance in the Workhouse,

Since the last meeting of the Board respects the wholemeal Bread supplied by the Contractor, for being badly baked. The Contractor refused supplying a substitute, and had to purchase white Bread in lieu of what was rejected.

Doct^r Brodie Poor Law Inspt^r, brought under the Board's consideration, a Letter from the Poor Law Commissioners on the subject of deodorising Night-soil by mixing it with earth, — The Workhouse Master was directed to carry out the Poor Law Commissioners suggestions in this respect, the Guardians much approving of same,

Resolved, that the Relieving Officer for the Ballinacole District be required to attend regularly on Wednesday in each week, and all other times when necessary, at Townacree in the Electoral Division of Cappaghduff, for the purpose of receiving applications for relief from poor persons residing in the Electoral Divisions of Ballinacole, Ballynaghy, Cappaghduff, and Queenbrint, in his District,

That the Board will hereafter consider the amount of gratuity which shall be prepared to recommend the Poor Law Commissioners to sanction for this additional duty,

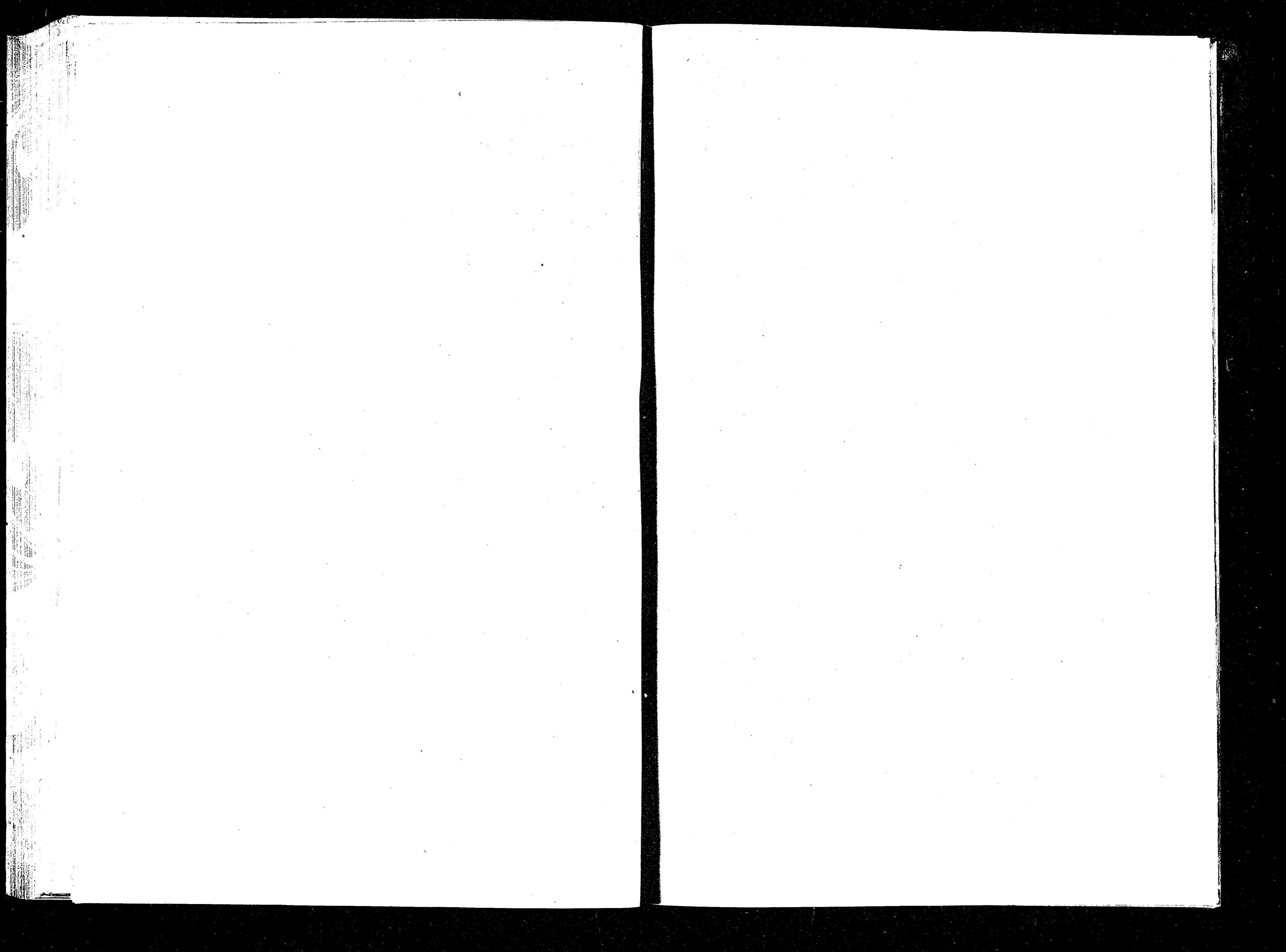
