





The same letter was stated that in a communication received from the Chief Secretary for Ireland notifying that the advance of this sum had been authorized it is stated that these advances should be repaid without delay without delay, out of the accruing rates. The Vice guardians will comply with the above expressed desire as soon as funds are at their disposal.

also a letter from same dated 21<sup>st</sup> Sept 1847 informing the chairman, that in accordance with the recommendation of the Vice guardians the Commissioners had sanctioned the appointment of Mr. James Kelly as Clerk of the Union at the salary proposed by the late board of

Ballinroyle, Kilmaine, Clanevarus, Partry, Ballyhally Ross, Kilmaine and Lough. — The Clerk is directed to advertise in the Castlerea Papers, and General Advertiser for all persons to whom the Union is indebted to furnish their Bills before the 8<sup>th</sup> of October next.

There is a very lamentable deficiency in Bedding which makes it necessary to put three persons in some beds. There are three Dormitories unoccupied on this account. The Vice Guardians have not means of remedying this evil, as their funds are insufficient to cover the ordinary expenses, but trust when the rate is put into collection this evil may be cured.

The Schools are all unsupplied with the most ordinary School requisites, which prevents the Master from efficiently performing his duty, the same remark is applicable to this as to the bedding.

There is no Nurse Sheds attached to the House which I fear will lead to a still more crowded state of the infirmary than at present. I think the Vice Guardians might consider whether they could not remove a part of the Infirmary from the distant & distant Divisions. There is opinion no Head Nurse engaged.


