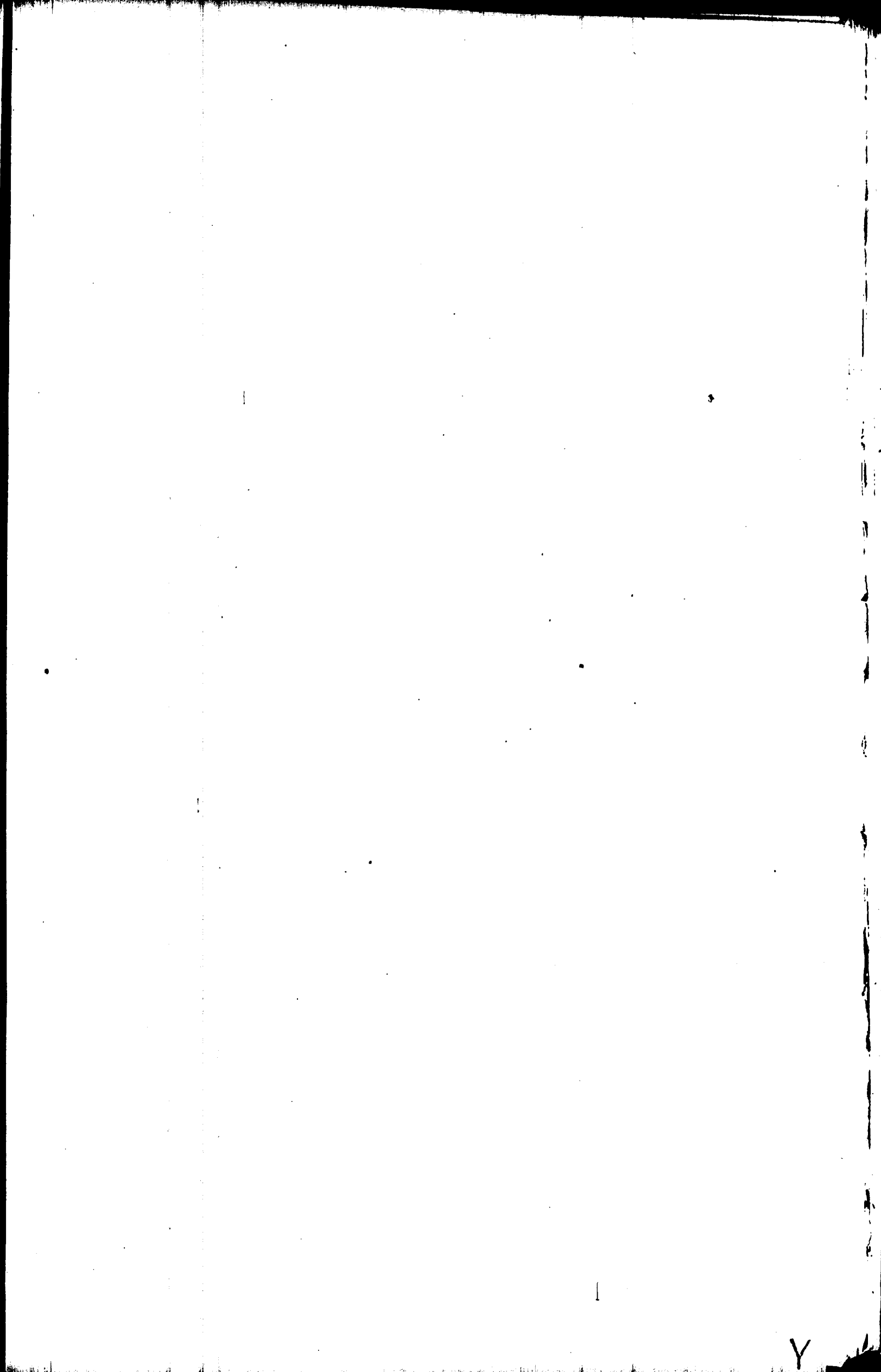
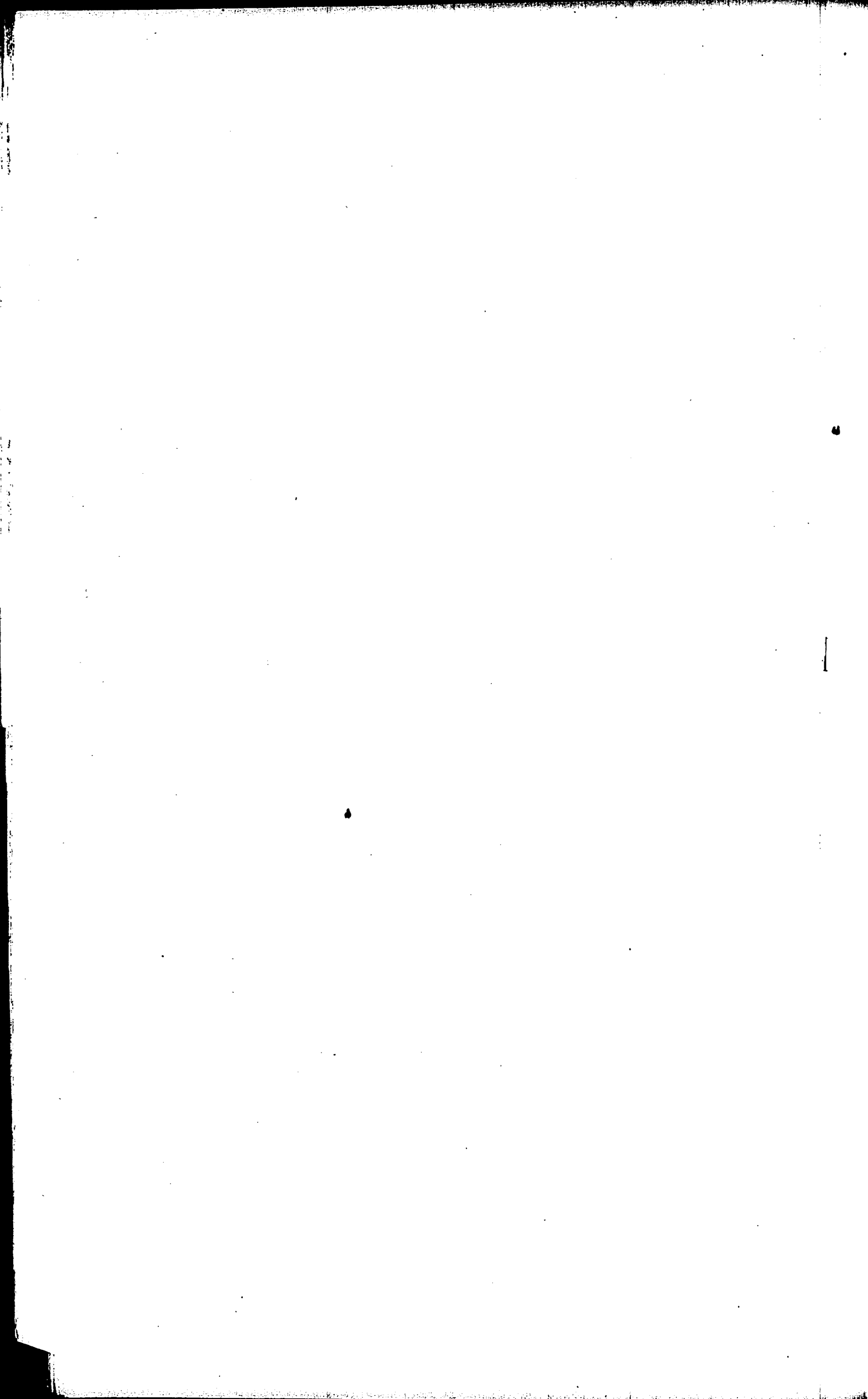

Mr Thomas May reported that his father, Clerk of the Union died on the 23rd April. Resolved that Mr Thomas May be appointed Acting Clerk of the Union at a remuneration of £3. per week pending the appointment of Clerk.

Resolved that the Acting Clerk be instructed to advertise in the General advertiser, Freeman's Journal Irish Times & in the local newspapers giving notice that the Board of Guardians will at their meeting to be held on Thursday the 16th May at 3 o'clock on that day proceed to the appointment of a Clerk at a salary of £200. per annum. The Draft of the advertisement was read and approved.

A receipt was signed by the Chairman and two Guardians and by the Acting Clerk of the Union to the Local Government Board for Ireland for a sum of Two Hundred and Fifty pounds. Tirteen Shillings and Eight pence being the amount of the Parliamentary Grant in aid of Educational and Medical Expenses incurred in the Half Year ended 31st March last.

A receipt was signed by the Chairman and two Guardians and by the Acting Clerk of the Union for a sum of Two Hundred and thirty pounds seven shillings and three pence being the amount payable to the Guardians of the Ballinacorney Union in respect of the Probate Duty, Grant for the year ended the 31st March last.

Read Letter from Local Government Board No. 59/89, dated 1st May 1899, a copy of the Board of Guardians of the Ballinrobe Union that they have received the report of their Inspector Dr Power, relating to his recent inspection of the several Dispensary Districts in which he states that the meetings of the Committees of Management are not held regularly, and the Board request that the Guardians will be so good as to use their influence with the members of the Committees to induce them to meet regularly in future.

Dr Power also reports that the Dispensary accommodation in the Ballinrobe District is very defective, that the waiting room of the Hollymount Dispensary is not kept clean or in good order and requires to be provided with a stove for the use of the patients attending for treatment, that the books are not duly posted in the Ballinrobe N.O. Dispensary District and that the half yearly Statements of the expenses of each Dispensary District are not forwarded to the Committees of Management as required by Article 32 of the Dispensary Regulations.

Dr Power further states that in his opinion due facilities do not exist for the issue of tickets for Medical relief to poor persons living in or near the Village of Hollymount, and the Board would suggest to the Guardians the propriety of appointing a gentleman residing in that locality to act as a warden for the Hollymount Dispensary District.

No attention has been paid to my observations made in writing at more than one audit on the excessive amount allowed to be in hands of the Clerk for Petty disbursements.

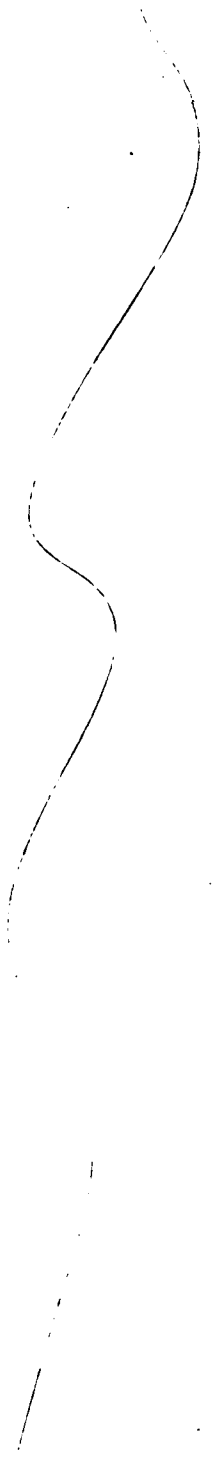
