Introduction

Knock is a small town in east Mayo just off the N17, the main route between Galway and Sligo. Famous as a major international Catholic site of pilgrimage, the Shrine in Knock is a focal point for the town and the wider area. The Shrine is set in 100 acres of beautiful landscape gardens and parkland providing a wonderful natural amenity for the town, as well as spiritual centre. The landscape around Knock is one of gently rolling farmland, bog, lakes and forestry. Several walking routes are being developed in the surrounding area so that walkers can enjoy the beautiful countryside.



The 'Knock Nature and Wildlife Plan 2014-2017' is a community-based biodiversity plan that outlines projects, activities and events that will run in the Knock area over a three year period for the benefit of nature and wildlife, the environment, and the local community. This plan aims to raise awareness of, protect and enhance the rich natural heritage in the area.

Biodiversity training was provided for the community in Knock in order to raise awareness of the importance of biodiversity and the many benefits of biodiversity for people, communities and the environment. Three biodiversity training sessions were held in Knock in early 2014 with a view to producing a local biodiversity plan for the area. The training and production of the plan was facilitated by a consultant ecologist but the projects in the plan were decided by the local community. This project is an action of the County Mayo Heritage Plan 2011- 2016.

Biodiversity simply refers to all living things (including plants, animals, microbes, fungi and people), the places where plants and animals etc. live (habitats), the interactions among living things (the web of life) and their environment (ecology). Biodiversity is the nature all around us, everywhere and in our everyday life. Biodiversity is life and sustains life on Earth. Biodiversity provides us with clean air and water, food,

fuel, building products and medicines. It also provides us with many free 'services' such as nutrient recycling, pollination and water filtration etc. Making space for nature in our towns and villages enhances and protects the local environment, and improves our quality of life by providing natural amenities for recreation (e.g. swimming, fishing, walking and relaxing).

The Tidy Towns group in Knock are working to improve local amenities and the local environment. The Shrine grounds are actively managed to provide a beautiful backdrop to the Shrine. The 'Knock Nature and Wildlife Plan 2014-2017' is an opportunity to learn more about the rich natural heritage in the area, to protect and enhance this wonderful resource for the benefit of nature and wildlife, visitors to the area and the local community.

Nature and wildlife in Knock

The landscape around Knock is largely agricultural with several raised bogs, small lakes and stands of conifer forestry. The Shrine dominates the town centre and the extensive grounds around the Shrine are beautifully landscaped. Numerous trees and shrubs have been planted, and flower beds near the buildings. These grounds are a haven for walkers and also provide wonderful habitat for wildlife.

The entrance roads to the town from the N17 have natural grassland and wetlands that are full of wild orchids and other wildflowers in early summer.

There are several small raised bogs in the surrounding landscape, such as Roosky Bog and Clarkefield Bog. Raised bogs started to form in former lake basins and depressions thousands of years ago after the end of the last Ice Age. Peat builds up very slowly over thousands of years to produce the deep layers of peat that are characteristic of raised bogs. The flora of raised bogs, such as the Bog cottons, Heathers and a rich variety of mosses, produces a tapestry of colour that changes through the seasons. Birds such as Curlew and Snipe nest in raised bogs, especially when there is a good cover of heather. Bogs are also an important part of our cultural heritage as they have been used for generations to provide fuel.
